The Learning Objectives of the Workshop Are:

I. Participants will learn how to write and review winning proposals including:

- * The essential components of a grant proposal package.
- * How to customize a proposal to match a grant maker's interest.
- * How to initially approach a funder.
- * The differences between government and foundation proposals.
- * How to report on a grant's progress and impact.
- * How to develop working relationships with grant makers.
- * What to do if your proposal is denied (don't give up!).
- * The behind-the-scenes decisions that determine proposal acceptance and denial.

II. Participants will also learn how to find and track relevant grant opportunities:

- * Where to find foundation grant programs that can help you accomplish your goals.
- * Where to find federal and state grant makers that meet your needs.
- * Where to find corporate giving programs whose giving goals match your funding needs.
- * How to stay on top of your targeted opportunities.

New Indirect Cost Rate for Truman

As of July 1, 2007 Truman's indirect rate is 40% of salaries, wages and fringe benefits. This is our DHHS Department of Health and Human Services - negotiated rate that should be used for all federal proposals. If you are preparing a budget please remember that our indirect cost rate is applied only to the total dollar amount for salaries, wages, and fringe benefits. And Please! Contact the Grants Office for assistance with budgets and proposals.

Significant Changes in NSF's New GPG

Previously, the NSF ***Grant Proposal Guide*** (GPG) was a stand-alone document. Now, as of June 1, 2007, the GPG has been incorporated as Part I of the new "NSF Proposal & Award Policies & Procedures Guide" (PAPPG).

Here are a few of the changes to the GPG (NSF 07-140) that involve preparing a proposal. To read a full summary of changes to the GPG go to http://www.nsf.gov/pubs/policydocs/papp/gpg_sigchanges.jsp.

Proposal Margin and Spacing Requirements, has entirely new guidance which specifies that four fonts may be used when preparing an NSF proposal. Times New Roman is NO LONGER an acceptable font for NSF proposals. Acceptable fonts are: Arial, Helvetica, Palatino (for Macintosh), Palatino Linotype (for Windows), Computer Modern (TeX only), or Georgia typeface, a black font color, and a font size of 10 points or larger must be used.

Salaries and Wages, has been clarified to show that individuals included on Lines A and B of the budget should be employees of the proposing organization. Compensation for consultants or sub-awardees, including salaries and wages, should not be included in that section of the budget.

Fringe Benefits, has been supplemented with further information on calculation of fringe benefits for different classes of employees.

Participant Support Costs, has been revised to show that for some educational projects conducted at local school districts, the participants are being trained as employees. If that is the case, the costs should be classified as participant support if a stipend or training allowance method is used.

It's important that every potential PI become familiar with these changes. See the web link listed above for a detailed description.

Former MAAA "Meet The Composer" Program Now Part of National Meet The Composer Program

If you are looking for the "Meet The Composer" grant opportunity you will no longer find it in the Mid-American Arts Alliance offerings. The national parent organization of Meet The Composer is now offering the program as the MetLife Creative Connections program.

MetLife Creative Connections provides support for U.S. composers to participate in public activities related to specific performances of their original music.

MetLife Creative Connections supports composer activities including but not limited to:

- pre- and post-performance discussions (in more formal concert venues);
- interaction with audience during and after the performance (in less formal concert venues);
- open workshops;
- radio, television, and webcast or podcast interviews;
- community outreach events;
- open rehearsals

MetLife Creative Connections applications are submitted by a Sponsoring Organization (a presenter, ensemble, dance company, etc.) requesting support for one or more composers. Completed and signed application forms along with all required materials are sent in a single packet to Meet The Composer according to the following quarterly schedule:

- *Postmarked by **JANUARY 7th 2008** for activities beginning April – June
- *Postmarked by **APRIL 1st 2008** for activities beginning July – August
- *Postmarked by **JUNE 1st 2008** for activities beginning September – December
- *Postmarked by **OCTOBER 1st 2007** for activities beginning January – March

Sponsoring Organizations (Truman) cannot apply for more than six composers per fiscal year (July 1 – June 30); cannot apply for more than \$5000 per deadline; cannot submit more than one application per deadline; cannot receive more than \$5000 from *MetLife Creative Connections* per fiscal year; cannot receive support for the same composer more than once per fiscal year.

Applications are accepted no earlier than one month prior to the appropriate deadline. If the composer activities extend beyond the time frame indicated above, apply for the deadline corresponding to when the activities **begin**. *MetLife Creative Connections* does not provide retroactive support for past composer activities.

The American Antiquarian Society (AAS), a national research library and learned society of American history and culture, is calling for applications for visiting fellowships for historical research by creative and performing artists, writers, film makers, journalists, and other persons whose goals are to produce imaginative, non-formulaic works dealing with pre-twentieth-century American history. Successful applicants are those whose work is for the general public rather than for academic or educational audiences. The Society's goal in sponsoring this program is to multiply and improve the ways in which an understanding of history is communicated to the American people. The fellowships will provide the recipients with the opportunity for a period of uninterrupted research, reading, and collegial discussion at the Society, located in Worcester, Massachusetts. FUNDING: At least three fellowships will be awarded for residence of four weeks at the Society at any time during the period January 1 through December 31. The stipend will be \$1,200, plus an allowance for travel expenses.

Pending confirmation of funding, the American Council of Learned Societies will offer support for postdoctoral research and writing in Southeast European studies in all disciplines of the humanities and social sciences. In awarding these grants, primary considerations are the scholarly merit of the proposal, its importance to the development of the field, and the scholarly potential and accomplishments of the applicant. Priority will be given to applicants in the early part of their careers, that is, before tenure. All proposals should be for scholarly work, the product of which is to be disseminated in English. Funds awarded may not be used in Western Europe. FUNDING: Scholars may apply for fellowships of up to \$25,000 for six to twelve consecutive months of full-time research and writing between July 1, 2008 and September 1, 2009. These fellowships are intended primarily as salary replacement to provide time free for research; the funds may be used to supplement sabbatical salaries, up to but not exceeding the Fellow's normal academic year salary.

Funded by the U.S. Department of State, Program for the Study of Eastern Europe and The Independent States of the Former Soviet Union (Title VIII), the American Councils Combined Research and Language Training (CRLT) Program serves graduate students and scholars who, in addition to support for research in the independent states of the former Soviet Union, require supplemental language instruction. Programs are available in Belarus, Central Asia, Russia, the South Caucasus, Ukraine, and Moldova. Scholars may apply for support in more than one country during a single trip but must plan to be in the field for a total of three to nine months. Those scholars seeking support for research and/or language study in the countries of Southeastern Europe should apply to the Title VIII Research and Language Training Programs for Southeastern Europe. FUNDING: The total value of Title VIII CRLT fellowships ranges from \$5,000 to \$25,000.

Since 1933 the American Philosophical Society has awarded small grants to scholars in order to support the cost of research leading to publication in all areas of knowledge. The Franklin program is particularly designed to help meet the costs of travel to libraries and archives for research purposes; the purchase of microfilm, photocopies, or equivalent research materials; the costs associated with fieldwork; or laboratory research expenses. ELIGIBILITY: Applicants are expected to have a doctorate or to have published work of doctoral character and quality. Predoctoral graduate students are not eligible, but the Society is particularly interested in supporting the work of young scholars who have recently received their Ph.D. American citizens and residents of the United States may use their Franklin awards at home or abroad. Foreign nationals must use their Franklin awards for research in the United States. FUNDING: Funding is offered up to a maximum of \$6,000 for use in calendar year 2008. In 2006-2007 the Franklin Research Grants program awarded over \$332,000 to 75 scholars, and the Society expects to make at least that many awards in this year's competition.

The American-Scandinavian Foundation (ASF) offers fellowships and grants to individuals to pursue research or study in one or more Scandinavian country for up to one year. Awards are made in all fields. ELIGIBILITY: Applicants must have a well-defined research or study project that makes a stay in Scandinavia essential. Applicants must be United States citizens or permanent residents. Applicants must have completed their undergraduate education by the start of their project in Scandinavia. Team projects are eligible, but each member must apply as an individual, submitting a separate, fully-documented application. FUNDING: Fellowship awards are for up to \$20,000. Grants are normally \$4,000. The awards support project-related costs, including maintenance, trans-Atlantic round-trip travel, in-country travel, tuition and fees (where applicable) and materials expenditures (e.g., books, photocopying, art supplies).

The objective of the NSF-AWM Travel Grants program is to enable women to attend research conferences in their fields, thereby providing a valuable opportunity to advance their research activities and their visibility in the research community. By having more women attend such meetings, we also increase the size of the pool from which speakers at subsequent meetings may be drawn and thus address the persistent problem of the absence of women speakers at some research conferences.

Travel Grants:

(a) The Mathematics Travel Grants provide full or partial support for travel and subsistence for a meeting or conference in the applicant's field of specialization. A maximum of \$1,500 for domestic travel and of \$2,000 for foreign travel will be available. For foreign travel, U.S. air carriers must be used (exceptions only per federal grant regulations; prior AWM approval required).

(b) The Mathematics Education Research Travel grants (NEW in 2006) provide full or partial support for travel and subsistence in math/math education research, for mathematicians attending a math education research conference or math education researchers attending a math conference. A maximum of \$1,500 for domestic travel and \$2,000 for foreign travel will be available. For foreign travel, U.S. air carriers must be used (exceptions only per federal grant regulations; prior AWM approval required).

Fellowships for the 2008-2009 academic year are offered for the development of courses that employ contemplative practices to address issues of social conflict and injustice, the amelioration of suffering, and the promotion of peace.

Approximately ten fellowships will be granted to support individual or collaborative research leading to the development of courses and teaching materials that include contemplative practices. The selection committee seeks proposals in which course content and contemplative practices are related to the consideration of social conflict and injustice, the amelioration of suffering, and the promotion of peace. Such contemplative practices can lead to genuine insights and deeper appreciation of the material under study. In a time of increasing uncertainty, strife and social fragmentation, practices that promote compassionate understanding, reconciliation and forgiveness are much needed.

We invite proposals from the full range of disciplinary and inter-disciplinary perspectives in the arts, humanities, social sciences, and sciences. Methodologies that include practical and experiential approaches to the subject matter are especially welcome.

These fellowships are intended to support scholars for developing curricula during a summer or an academic-year semester. Individual scholars, partnerships, or groups of scholars may apply, but the maximum stipend will not exceed \$10,000 for any one project.

Earthwatch Institute is an international non-profit organization that supports scholarly field research worldwide in the biological, physical, social, and cultural sciences. The Research Program at Earthwatch is responsible for soliciting, reviewing, and recommending research proposals for support. Earthwatch provides scientists with the funding and labor they need in the form of motivated, dedicated, paying volunteers. This unique funding model enables us to support research in a variety of disciplines, on the basis of a researcher's need for volunteers and Earthwatch's ability to find them.

ELIGIBILITY: Earthwatch supports doctoral and post-doctoral researchers, or researchers with equivalent scholarship or commensurate life experience. The Research Program welcomes proposals from advanced scholars and professionals of any nationality. In general Earthwatch considers work in any geographic region.

FUNDING: Earthwatch awards research grants on a per capita basis; the total grant amount is determined by multiplying the per capita grant by the number of Earthwatch volunteers participating on a project. Per capita grants average \$850, and the average project grant range is between \$17,000 and \$51,000 for one full season. A project usually involves 30 to 60 total volunteers per field season, with 5 to 12 volunteers each on 4 to 5 teams. Each team typically spends 8 to 15 days in the field. Earthwatch grants cover the cost of maintaining volunteers and principal research staff in the field. The grants may also assist with other project expenses, but cannot be used for PI salaries, capital equipment, or overhead costs.

Predoctoral and Postdoctoral Fellowships provide support for emerging scholars to complete work on projects related to the Getty Research Institute's annual theme. The theme for 2008-2009 is Networks and Boundaries. Recipients are in residence at the Getty Research Institute, where they pursue research to complete their dissertations or to expand them for publication. Fellows make use of the Getty collections, join in a weekly meeting devoted to the annual theme, and participate in the intellectual life of the Getty Center.

ELIGIBILITY: Applications are welcome from scholars of all nationalities who are working in the arts, humanities, or social sciences. Predoctoral fellowship applicants must have advanced to candidacy by the time of the fellowship start date and expect to complete their dissertations during the fellowship period. (Predoctoral fellows who receive their doctorate while in residence automatically become Postdoctoral fellows.) Postdoctoral fellowship applicants must have received their degree no earlier than 2001.

FUNDING: Predoctoral and Postdoctoral Fellows are in residence for the entire academic year (from September 2008 to June 2009). Predoctoral fellows receive a total stipend of \$18,000 for the nine-month residency. Postdoctoral fellows receive a total stipend of \$22,000 for the nine-month residency. Both fellowships also provide an office at the Research Institute, an apartment in the Getty scholar housing complex, airfare to Los Angeles, and health benefits. Neither fellowship is renewable.
