Shared by Dr. Kathie Olsen, Deputy Director & Chief Operating Officer, Nat'l. Science Foundation, at the Council on Undergraduate Research (CUR) Dialogues, held in Washington D.C., March '07

**1.** Don't have a hypothesis. (an idea that is the starting point for making a case or conducting an investigation)

2. Don't think you need to describe methods and pilot data. (Everyone knows I can do it!!)

3. Don't involve students. (Who needs them!)

4. Don't include references or include 20-year year old references. (After all, I'm an expert!)

5. Ask for maximum funding. (\$2million and a new building!)

6. Ignore what's happening in D.C. (Why should I care about federal budget development?)

7. Ignore the requirements and review criteria. (I don't need to read all that stuff!)

8. Don't call a program officer. (What does a bureaucrat in Washington know anyway!)

9. Get an award and it's party time! (I've got the money. I don't need to get results or publish!)

10. Get declined and get offended. (I am NEVER submitting to that agency again!)

The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP)-Deems Taylor Award program recognizes books, articles, broadcasts and websites on the subject of music selected for their excellence. SUPPORT PROVIDED: Several categories of cash prizes ranging from \$250 to \$1,000 are presented to award-winning books and newspaper, journal or magazine articles includes program and liner notes). Plaques are also presented to the authors and journalists as well as to their respective publishers. APPLICANT INFORMATION: Written works must be published in the U.S., in English, during the calendar year of 2006. The subject matter may be biographical or critical, reportorial, or historical--any

form of nonfiction prose about music and/or its creators. Instructional textbooks, how-to-guides, or works of fiction are not eligible. Paperbacks that were originally published in hardcover are not eligible. Reprints or translations of works that were previously published outside the United States that are now being published in the United States for the first time are eligible. Program notes, recording liner notes, and on-line publications are also eligible. APPLICATION INFORMATION: There is no official entry form or fee; however, all submissions must include a cover letter containing the following information: 1) title of book, article, program or linger notes; 2) copyright date of book or date of publication for the article (or issue date for recording liner notes); 3) name, address, and daytime phone number of all authors of the book or article; and 4) contact name, address, and daytime phone number of the publisher or publication in which the article appeared. Four copies of each entry are required. Books and articles submitted will not be returned. For articles, submissions are limited to three entries per author; those articles that were published as a series of articles on a single, specific subject may be considered as one entry. When submitting one or more articles, be sure there are four copies of each article, collated and put into four file folders. (These folders will be distributed to the judges.) Liner notes should be limited to 4,500 words and include four copies of each recording. For additional information, contact Esther SanSaurus above. Materials are accepted beginning January 31 through April 30, 2007.

The Academy of American Poets was founded in 1934 to support American poets at all stages of their careers and to foster the appreciation of contemporary poetry. The James Laughlin Award is given to recognize and support a poet's second book. It is the only second-book award for poetry in the United States. Offered since 1954, the award was endowed in 1995 by a gift to the Academy from the Drue Heinz Trust. It is named for the poet and publisher James Laughlin (1914-1997), who founded

SUPPORT PROVIDED: The Academy awards the winning poet a cash prize of \$5,000 and purchases copies of the book for distribution to its members.

APPLICANT INFORMATION: Only manuscripts already under contract with publishers are considered for the James Laughlin Award. The James Laughlin Award is given to honor a second book of original poetry, in English, by a living citizen of the United States. To be eligible, a poet

must have published one book of poetry in a standard edition (40 pages or more in length and 500 or more copies). Additional books on a smaller scale, such as chapbooks and limited editions, will not disqualify a poet. Although an eligible book may already have been published, it must be submitted in manuscript form (or page proofs) so that the jury can compare entries without considering the books' appearance. Bound books or galleys will not be accepted.

APPLICATION INFORMATION: Submissions are accepted each year from January 1 to May 15. An entry form, signed by the publisher, is required. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA) awards Scholarships for Minority Accounting Students to full-time minority students enrolled as accounting majors. This scholarship program provides awards of up to \$5,000 to outstanding minority students to encourage their selection of accounting as a major and their ultimate entry into the profession. Scholarships are awarded each July for the following academic year.

APPLICANT INFORMATION: To be eligible for an undergraduate scholarship, an applicant must be: 1) a declared accounting major with an overall and accounting grade point average (GPA) of at least 3.3; 2) a minority student who has satisfactorily completed at least 30 semester

hours, or 45 quarter hours, equivalent college work including at least six semester hours in accounting; and 3) enrolled as a full-time undergraduate student (12 semester hours or equivalent), unless he or she completing their final semester of study, at a four-year or upper

division institution. Students who will be attending a four-year school for the first time must include an acceptance letter from the school. To be eligible for a graduate scholarship, the applicant must be: A) a minority student who is enrolled in the final year of a five-year

accounting program or an undergraduate accounting major who is presently accepted or enrolled in a master-level accounting; business administration, finance or taxation program, or who had any undergraduate major and is presently accepted in a master-level accounting program; and B) enrolled as a full-time graduate student (nine semester hours or equivalent), unless he or she is completing their final semester of study. For purposes of this program, the AICPA defines minority students as those of Black, Native American/Alaskan Native, Pacific Island races, or of Hispanic ethnic origin. All applicants must be U.S. citizens. NOTE: Persons who are already CPAs are not eligible for this program.

The Horticultural Research Institute (HRI) is the research arm of the American Nursery and Landscape Association (ANLA). Its mission is to direct, fund, promote, and communicate research that increases the quality and value of plants, improves the productivity and profitability

of the nursery and landscape industry, and protects and enhances the environment. HRI offers annual, competitive grant awards to deserving scientists and members of the nursery and landscape industry. Its research priorities are in the broad categories of: new plant

development, horticulture management, pest management, resource management, mechanization and applied technology, and marketing research and business development. Industry leaders evaluate the significance and economic usefulness of projects; HRI's scientific advisory panel assesses their feasibility and methodology.

SUPPORT PROVIDED: To enable maximum flexibility, no minimum dollar amount of support is established. Proposals may run from one to three years, with an application for continued funding required each year. Satisfactory completion of a one-year grant may lead to expedited funding of a continuing proposal for the same project. HRI has funded over \$2.5 million in research grants. APPLICANT INFORMATION: Topical significance is the key criterion for proposal selection. Interdisciplinary proposals among departments and/or universities are encouraged.
