Applications will be considered for study in the history, theory, and criticism of the visual arts (painting, sculpture, architecture, landscape architecture, urbanism, prints and drawings, film, photography, decorative arts, industrial design, and other arts) of any geographical area and of any period. Applications are also solicited from scholars in other disciplines whose work examines artifacts or has implications for the analysis and criticism of visual form. ELIGIBILITY: Visiting Senior Fellowships are intended for those who have held the Ph.D. for five years or more or who possess an equivalent record of professional accomplishment at the time of application. Visiting Senior Fellowships are awarded without regard to the age or nationality of applicants. FUNDING: The Center awards up to twelve short-term (up to 60 days) Paul Mellon and Ailsa Mellon Bruce Visiting Senior Fellowships. Visiting senior fellows receive stipends that include round-trip travel and local expenses. Stipends for two-month fellowships range from \$6,000 to \$8,000, depending on relocation requirements. Visiting senior fellows may be eligible for a \$1,500-per-month housing allowance made possible with funds from the Paul Mellon Bequest. In addition, fellows receive allowances for photography. The Center will consider appointment of associates who have obtained awards for full-time research from granting institutions other than their home institutions and would like to be affiliated with the Center. Appointments to associate status will be considered for periods of up to 60 days. Qualifications and selection for associate status are the same as those for visiting senior fellows.

Grants for Summer Seminars and Institutes support national faculty development programs in the humanities for school teachers and for college and university teachers. Seminars and institutes may be as short as two weeks or as long as six weeks. The duration of a program should allow for full and thorough treatment of the topic. Summer seminars and institutes: (a) extend and deepen knowledge and understanding of the humanities by focusing on significant topics, texts, and issues; (b) enhance the intellectual vitality and professional development of participants; (c) build a community of inquiry and provide models of excellent scholarship and teaching; and (d) promote effective links between teaching and research in the humanities. ELIGIBILITY: Seminars and institutes may be hosted by colleges, universities, school systems, learned societies, centers for advanced study, libraries or other repositories, and cultural or professional organizations. The host site must be appropriate for the project, providing facilities for scholarship and collegial interaction. FUNDING: In last year's competition, NEH anticipated that awards for seminars would range between \$45,000 and \$120,000 in outright funds for a grant period of fifteen months.

Preservation Assistance Grants help small and mid-sized institutions, such as libraries, museums, historical societies, archival repositories, town and county records offices, and colleges, improve their ability to preserve and care for their humanities collections. These may include special collections of books and journals, archives and manuscripts, prints and photographs, moving images, sound recordings, architectural and cartographic records, decorative and fine arts, textiles, archaeological and ethnographic artifacts, furniture, and historical objects.

Applicants must draw on the knowledge of consultants whose preservation skills and experience are related to the types of collections and the nature of the activities that are the focus of their projects. Within the conservation field, for example, conservators usually specialize in the care of specific types of collections, such as objects, paper, or paintings. Applicants should therefore choose a conservator whose specialty is appropriate for the nature of their collections. Similarly, when assessing the preservation needs of archival holdings, applicants should seek a consultant specifically knowledgeable about archives and preservation. Because the organization and the preservation of archival collections must be approached in tandem, an archival consultant can also provide advice about the management needs of such holdings as part of a preservation assessment. Small and mid-sized institutions that have never received an NEH grant are especially encouraged to apply.

Award Information: Outright grants of up to \$5,000 will be awarded. All grants are awarded for a period of eighteen months; however, a grantee may complete a project in a shorter period of time. When all project activities have been completed, the final report should be submitted and the grant will then be considered closed

Eligibility: Any U.S. nonprofit organization with 501(c)3 tax exempt status is eligible, as are state and local governmental agencies and tribal governments. Grants are not awarded to individuals. NEH will give priority to smaller institutions, and to institutions that have not previously received an NEH grant.

Artists across the United States will have a chance to promote their works-in-progress and works-to-be when the nonprofit arts organization Creative Capital accepts proposals for its 2007 grant cycle supporting projects in the visual arts and film/video.

For the first time, Creative Capital has appointed two outside teams of arts professionals to assist in the selection process, which could lead to as many as forty grants.

In keeping with the organization's multi-level commitment to its grantees, a total of at least \$1 million is allocated for selected projects in the first year. In addition, over the term of the grant these projects receive follow-up support and can garner as much as \$80,000 each in direct monies and services. Moreover, the grantees gain access to an extensive network of peers and arts professionals who can assist in fundraising, promotional, and presenting opportunities. This comprehensive approach to funding has become the hallmark of Creative Capital's work with artists.

To be eligible to apply, an artist must be a U.S. citizen or a permanent legal resident; at least 25 years old; and a working artist with at least five years of professional experience.

To apply, artists must first submit an inquiry form, which will be available February 5, 2007, on the foundation's Web site. The deadline for completed forms is March 5, 2007; those invited to submit an application with work samples will be notified in June 2007.

The Liguria Study Center offers residential fellowships for artists and scholars in the arts and humanities. The Center is located on the Italian Riviera in the small town of Bogliasco. Bogliasco Fellowships are granted to qualified persons doing advanced creative work or scholarly research in the following disciplines: archaeology, architecture, classics, dance, film or video, history, landscape architecture, literature, music, philosophy, theater, and visual arts. With respect to dance, music, and theater, the Study Center does not have studio facilities for artists wishing to work extensively in performance. Applicants for Fellowships are expected to demonstrate significant achievement in their disciplines, commensurate with their age and experience. In addition, they must submit descriptions of the projects that they intend to pursue in Bogliasco. An approved project is presumed to lead to the completion of a major work followed by publication, performance, production, or exhibition. Bogliasco Fellowships are scheduled during the two semesters of the traditional academic year. During 2006-2007 the dates are as follows: residencies during the fall-winter semester: September 10 to December 14; winter-spring semester: February 11 to May 16. Fellowships usually have a duration either of one month (31-32 days) or a half semester (48 days). In special circumstances residencies of other lengths may be approved. Bogliasco Fellows may be accompanied by spouses (or spouse-equivalent companions) during their stay at the Liguria Study Center. Spouses or companions who intend to pursue a project in one of the disciplines, and who wish to be designated as Bogliasco Fellows, must submit separate and complete applications. The Bogliasco Foundation encourages such joint applications. Children and pets are not permitted at the

Center. Visits by friends, colleagues, or family members are not allowed, except by special, prior arrangement. The Center has a maximum capacity of sixteen persons.

SUPPORT PROVIDED: During their stay at the Center, Bogliasco Fellows and accompanying spouses/companions are provided with living quarters (bedroom with private bath) and full yard. Fellows are assigned separate private studios. Spouses and companions working on their own projects have access to study areas located within the living quarters. The cost of transportation to and from Genoa is the responsibility of Fellows or their accompanying spouses/companions. So also are all other personal expenses incurred during the fellowship period, including the purchase of materials and supplies. Most artists and scholars use their time at the Liguria Study Center to pursue projects for which the basic preparation or research has already been done, bringing with them the materials needed to complete their work. When necessary, however, Bogliasco Fellows have access--in some cases special access--to the major libraries, museums, and other cultural resources in Genoa.

Hugh le May Fellowships are available every other year. Applications are invited for the Hugh le May Fellowship for the year 2006. The Fellowship is available in alternate years to applicants who wish to devote themselves to advanced work (post-doctoral) in one of the following subjects: Philosophy, Classics, Ancient, Mediaeval or Modern History, Classical, Biblical, Mediaeval or Modern Languages, Political Theory, and Law. Where there is no applicant of sufficient merit in any of the above subjects, the Fellowship may be awarded to an applicant in some other subject falling within the Faculty of Humanities. The Fellow will be required to make a suitable acknowledgement of the Fellowship in a form acceptable to the University should publications result from the research undertaken during the period of the Fellowship.

SUPPORT PROVIDED: The Fellowship is of 3-4 months duration consisting of a return economy air ticket to the Fellow's place of residence, furnished University accommodation and a small monthly cash stipend. The successful applicant will be expected to take up residence in Grahamstown for such period, not exceeding to four months between 1 January 2006 and 31 December 2006, as may be negotiated with the University. The length of the Fellowship may be extended by mutual agreement and subject to the availability of funds.

The American Historical Association (AHA) is a nonprofit membership organization founded in 1884 and incorporated by Congress in 1889 for the promotion of historical studies, the collection and preservation of historical documents and artifacts, and the dissemination of historical research. The association currently administers two major fellowships, twenty-three book prizes, and a number of small research grants. The Albert J. Beveridge Grant supports research in the history of the Western Hemisphere (United States, Canada, and Latin America).

SUPPORT PROVIDED: Grants of up to \$1,000 are awarded to further research in progress. The grants are intended to further research in progress and may be used for travel to a library or archive, for microfilms, photographs, or photocopying-a list of purposes that is meant to be merely illustrative, not exhaustive. The Phillips Fund of the American Philosophical Society provides grants for research in Native American linguistics, ethnohistory, and the history of studies of Native Americans, in the continental United States and Canada. Grants are not made for projects in archaeology, ethnography, psycholinguistics, or for the preparation of pedagogical materials. The committee distinguishes contemporary ethnography from ethnohistory as the study of cultures and culture change through time. The grants are intended for such extra costs as travel, tapes, films, and consultants' fees, but not for general maintenance or the purchase of books or permanent equipment.

SUPPORT PROVIDED: The average award is about \$2,500; grants do not exceed \$3,000. Grants are given for one year following the date of the award.

APPLICANT INFORMATION: The committee prefers to support the work of younger scholars who have received the doctorate. Applications are also accepted from graduate students for research on masters or doctoral dissertations. The committee sometimes approves two awards to the same person within a five-year period.
